Kevin Boe brought meeting to order at 8:00 am.

Update on Programs

Randi Litchy, Isabelle Sinkler, Jeff Heisler presented.

Fall Adult Programs:

- Adaptive Art Classes These classes were very well received by the participants.
- Adult Volleyball This program was completed with little or no issues with 143 teams.
- Adult 3-on-3 Basketball We had 24 teams play in our fall 3-on-3 leagues. They play on Sundays at Fargo North. That is the maximum we can take in the leagues. These league numbers continue to stay strong.
- Adult Flag Football Great numbers with the league has been running well.
 - Some discussion was made regarding being self-refereed.
- Adult/Family Archery Struggle with finding instructors but classes were covered, and participants didn't miss any sessions.

Fall Youth Programs:

- Art classes Classes were held again at the RDJ building and are usually maxed out with 12 per class.
- Youth table tennis was offer again at the Sport Arena with 15-20 kids participating. We have volunteers teaching the classes.
- We had 2 Awesome Arts this Fall, and both were held at the RDJ gymnasium. On September 30th, we had about 90 participants and on November 11th, we had about 125 participants.
- Sports Sampler This program is designed for 4- to 6-year-olds. Due to the different social and physical levels of these ages we changed the format. The first group that meets at 5:15 PM was four-year-olds and the 6:15 PM group was five- and six-year-olds. This worked better to split them up. We will continue this format. We had 17 participants in the two groups. Typically, our fall numbers are our smallest due to the timing of registration and children starting school at the same time.
- 3rd and 4th Grade Volleyball League. We had five teams in this league. Each team had eight players. This league had four teams practice at Clara Barton. One team at 5:15, two teams at 6:15 and one team at 7:15. The fifth team practiced at 6:30 at Roosevelt. All teams practice Mondays and Tuesdays and play games on Thursdays. Games were played at Clara Barton.
- Youth Flag Football This fall, we were fully staffed with referees and had a good season

- for the weather. Everything went well for participants and staff.
- Intro to Climbing 2 Sessions with great numbers September 17 kids and October 10 Kids. Working with Fargo Climbing has been very smooth.
- Youth Archery Struggles with instructors but participants still had good time.

Winter Adult Programs and Activities:

- Adult Volleyball With no storm days this program went very smoothly again this Winter with a total of 142 teams.
- Winterfest Volleyball This tournament continues to get enough teams to be held. Saturday was strong with 36 teams. Sunday was a little more of a struggle with only 19 teams. We ended up getting 55 total teams. We had teams from as far away as Dickinson, St. Cloud, and Winnipeg.
- 5-on-5 Basketball We had 30 teams play in leagues this winter. There were 12 teams on Sundays and 12 teams on Wednesdays at Fargo North. There were 6 teams on Mondays at Courts Plus. These leagues continue to slowly decline like the national and regional trends. Finding officials is also difficult due to the shortage of officials. We offered a call your own foul league and only had one team interested. We will keep offering this league and hopefully generate more interest next winter.
- Adult Hockey Great season, numbers held steady.
- Drop-In Hockey Steady numbers each week and the group seems to enjoy this time.
- Broomball Steady numbers for this league with little change for the participants.
- Drop In Broomball Numbers are lower this season.
- Table Tennis This class was full. The new location at Cornerstone has been well received. A lot less wear and tear on equipment.
 - Discussion was made by Commissioner Dawson regarding table tennis during the summer on Fowler Rink.
- Adaptive Art Classes These classes were very well received by the participants.
- MS Group Group holding steady and enjoying their time together.

Winter Youth Programs and Activities:

- Swimming Lessons NEW this winter we were able to add a winter session of swimming lessons. These lessons were held at Davies Indoor Pool for three weeks in January. We had 74 registrants. Lots of positive feedback was given. Lessons were held after the swim team completed practice. Finding enough instructors is a big challenge. We have a small number of instructors, so this worked well to add a session when other lessons are not taking place.
 - Discussion was made by Commissioner Dawson regarding family swimming lessons.
- Art classes (Artmania/ages 6-8) (Accelerated Artist/ages 9-12) (Mr. And Mrs. Claus/ages 4-10) Most classes were at near or at capacity.
- Sports Sampler We had 13 registrants for the 4-year-old group at 5:15 PM and 20 registrants for the 5- and 6-year-old group at 6:15 PM. This works well.

- Basketball Our youth basketball has two groups of kindergarten and 1st graders.
 On group at 5:15 and the other group at 6:00 PM. There is a groups of 2nd graders at 6:45 PM. There were 77 total registrants. All three time slots were full. This program is held at Centennial School gym on Tuesdays and Thursdays for six weeks. We use Centennial since the baskets are adjustable down to eight feet.
- Adaptive Art Classes We did not have this class during our Winter season.
 Our instructor was not able to teach it this Winter. We do plan on having it again in the Spring.
- 1889 Classes- This is a new partnership. We had 4 kids in the cooking class, and 4 kids in the art class. The participants loved it. Marketing has done a great job in getting the word out.

Winter Indoor/Outdoor Facility:

- Edgewood Chalet During the winter we normally have the Edgewood Chalet open weekdays from 4 8 PM and weekends from 12 8 PM. We typically rent cross country skis, boots, and poles. We also rent snowshoes. All rentals must remain on site. We also offer concessions. There is also a sledding hill along the first fairway with lighting for nighttime sledding. When there is ample snow our operations team grooms ski trails. Classic and Skate Ski trails. Due to a lack of snow, we have not been open a single day this winter. With the Tavern converting to a seasonal facility, we plan to bring back private rentals of the fireplace room in the winter and allow the rentals to have potlucks again.
- Open Swim- We hold this at South Indoor Pool on the weekends from 1pm-5pm.
 We have had great attendance this year. Courts Plus members can enter for free. We average about 50 patrons/weekend.
 - Kevin had mentioned that if you haven't stopped by the Sports Arena or the Metro Rec you should swing by. The new lighting is a game changer.
